On a beautiful July 10th Saturday, the Bearspaw Lion 's Club of NW Rockyview County held a "drop off" paper shredding event with the firm of Pulp Shred, an environmentally advanced paper recycling company. Pulp Shred doesn't manage the shredding activity with large emissions and dust emitting truck units on site but rather through collecting and securing documents for further shredding management at a "state of the art" facility.

In all the club volunteers and Pulp Shred employees (only the Pulp Shred folk handled any of the paper brought for processing) saw around 50 drop offs of boxes, containers and bags of paper to be shredded.

Our little event recycled over 2,967 lbs of paper and cardboard which equates to saving of 25 new trees and diverting 4.9 cubic yards of landfill space! This was a free event for our community participants but we asked for consideration

to make a donation towards the Lion 's Youth Camp and as such were very fortunate to collect over \$1,280 in addition to a generous donation from Pulp Shred of \$1,000. In all then, close to \$2,300 will be going to the very worthy clause and our effort made a small but important contribution to our environment.

Cochrane Lions Club - A Busy & Productive 2021



The Cochrane Lions Club has strived to stay active and relevant within the District and our

community during the period of restrictions brought on by the Covid pandemic. As most Clubs have discovered, the needs of charitable groups, individuals and communities are not "on hold" during difficult times and in many cases the needs increase.

Our Club was forced to cancel our yearly Labour Day Weekend Rodeo in 2020 due to Covid restrictions. This event would have been in its 52nd year and not only benefits our Club but the Town of Cochrane and most local businesses.

In lieu of the event, our Club conducted a food drive in the community and was able to deliver a truckload of food donations to the Activettes Food Bank for distribution. A cash donation was due largely to the contribu-



tions of the rodeo sponsors. In addition, we sponsored a fireworks display on the evening of the Labour Day Monday.

Our Labour Day Weekend Rodeo planning is well underway for our 2021 event. Our Rodeo Committee and many local volunteers are working within a limited time frame to provide another successful, memorable & well attended event.

Our Club continues to promote & operate the Cochrane Lions Event Centre. The Centre is located in the old town Curling Club which was no longer required due to a new facility being



opened. With the absence of a community centre, the Club entered an agreement with the Town of Cochrane to operate the Centre which has hosted many events. Covid restrictions forced several cancellations at the Centre and prevented the booking of events, however the Club has

maintained the facility which is again accepting bookings.

Seeing a need to continue to fundraise, the Club held a Beef Draw earlier this year which was hugely successful.

Our Club continues to manage & operate the Bow Rivers Edge Campground (BRECS) in partnership with The Rotary Club of Cochrane. We provide 4 members to the Board of Directors along with 4 Rotarians. The Campground was designated as a "14-day quarantine campground" for snowbirds returning from the United States during the height of the pandemic. Not only is BRECS a benefit to both Clubs, it has donated just under \$1

million to local and area groups through a community grant program.

During the pandemic, our Club continued to support many community causes making financial contributions to the Mountainview Junior Rodeo, Kid 's Cancer Care, CLERC, Cochrane Activettes Food Bank (picture right -Lion Keith Garner presenting cheque in middle), Bow Val-



ley High School Family Support Centre, Cochrane Generals Hockey Club, Calgary & Area Soap For Hope Foundation and a local family fundraising for a child requiring reconstructive surgery. In addition, we continue to support all 3 community high schools with a \$1,000 yearly educational scholarship each year.

Our Club gladly resumed in person meetings on July 6th and has returned to a 1st & 3rd Tuesday meeting schedule. The Club has also managed to increase our membership by 3 during the past




year and have had additional guests attend our first 2 meetings this year as prospective members.

We have recently committed \$15,000 towards the reconstruction of Lions Centennial Park Playground in

partnership with other local groups and the Variety Club to install new "inclusive" playground equipment making the playground more accessible to children with disabilities. Construction is expected to be completed in the fall of this year.

The Club was due to host a casino prior to the restrictions imposed during Covid which was of course cancelled. We are grateful to have now been assigned new Casino dates for August 9 & 10, 2021.

Working with the Bridge City Gunners Disc Golf Club and the City of

Lethbridge, the new course is being developed in Lethbridge 's Peenaquim Park near the Oldman River.

Disc golf as a sport is growing quickly in Canada and has become very popular in Lethbridge and area, as well as elsewhere. Virtually anyone can play it, of all ages and abilities, because it requires minimal personal equipment (discs) and there is no charge for casual play.

The new disc golf course will be the second 18-hole disc golf site in the city and is expected to facilitate more tournaments and provide greater access to anyone in the community who wishes to play.



The baskets or "holes" for the course are ready for installation and we hope the Lethbridge West Lions Club Disc Golf Course will be ready to welcome players very soon.

P.U.G. DAY in OLDS - "Keeping our community garbage free"

The Olds Lions Club was able to conduct its annual P.U.G. (Pick Up Garbage) clean up day on June 3 despite the Covid environment and restrictions that existed. P.U.G. Day is a day in which the Lions Club of Olds, partnered with the Town of Olds, coordinate a 'clean up' of the Town of refuse that has collected over the winter. Participants include the students of all 6 schools in the community, Lions members, other service clubs, and individuals as well as neighbourhood groups. In an average year, approximately 1500 participants in our town of approximately 9500 participate for several hours picking up garbage on the designated day. The Town provides gloves and garbage bags and the Lions Club designate 24 drop off spots where bags of garbage can be left. The Town maintenance department picks up the bags in the evening and take them to the regional landfill.

The Lions Club presents a Chrome Tablet to one participant in each school by way of a draw. Covid did play a part in our ability to tackle the ' p roject ' ,but we look forward to returning to normal conditions next year. The project fits very well with one of LCI 's major objectives , protecting the environment.

The Lions Youth Camp is located 12 kms east of Cremona, North of Highway 580.

The camp was built for use by youth groups, with the occasional rental to adult groups for retreats or family reunions.

Due to the COVID 19 pandemic, the camp was closed form mid March 202 until late July 2021.

During this 16-month period, many changes have taken place. In June 2020, the Custodian/Manager 's contract was terminated, because of him refusing to work with the board in cutting operating costs. After this termination and an inspection of the camp, the board realized that the Custodian/Manager had not been maintaining the Camp per his contract. The buildings were filthy inside, the cabins were in desperate need of exterior painting, the maintenance equipment was in disrepair, the water smelled like hydrogen sulphide, and the air flow systems in the Main Hall were not working properly.

During the summer and fall, Board members volunteered at the Camp, doing maintenance on the equipment, repairing other equipment such as the generator and the pressure washer, doing some exterior painting, cleaning the inside of the buildings, mowing the grass, removing dangerous trees, and cleaning the eavestroughs.

In October, the Board hired a new Custodian/Manager - Dennis Both.

This was done to ensure that we had someone being on site part time each week to comply with keeping our insurance valid, rather than shutting down the camp completely. The new Custodian/Manager has proven to be a worthy investment. He has worked tirelessly at cleaning and upgrading

Peace Poster & Essay Contests "We Are All Connected" -Theme for 2021-2022

DG Michelle asked if I would be this year 's District Chairperson for the Peace Poster and Essay Contest – and I am happy to do so.

From the first time I saw the Peace Posters, I found it difficult to believe that they had been done by children ages 11-13. And when I read their thoughts on the theme for that year, I was even more amazed. The artist talent is one thing, but the thoughtfulness of these young people made me very humble. So often we overlook the children because they ARE children, but we have so much to learn from these young people.

If there had been an 'in-person' International Convention, we would have been able to see the Peace Poster finalists. But since that didn 't happen, I will share a little of what I know.

Last year, **2020-2021**, the theme was " **Peace Through Service**" and as you all know, with the pandemic restrictions and lockdowns.

' S ervice ' was a challenge. The Grand Prize Peace

Poster winner was 13 years old Yue Zheng, sponsored by the Dalian De Long Lions Club in China. Her description of her poster is the dove of peace opening its wings and flying towards the sky, providing service all kinds of service to achieve peace. Peace represents balance and therefore harmony. It provides a better living environment for all people, and it allows countries to continue to develop. She hopes that everyone who view her work will have a seed of peace planed in their heart and we will create peace together. Service provided by all nations always is critical in creating peach. Everyone is a participant in this. Please reach out your selfless hands and let us imbue and create peace through service in every corner of the world.

The 2020-2021 Essay winner was Joshua Wood, age 13 sponsored by the Brisbane Camphill Carindale Lions Club, Australia.

It was fascinating watching him ' read ' his essay in Braille, but his words soon captured my heart, while he talked about his grandfather. I have listened to his essay a few times and gone on YouTube to hear other essay winners. And I believe, that with young people like Yue Zheng and Joshua Wood, the future of the world is looking pretty good!

Talented thoughtful young people are all over the world – and we have many in our District. I believe we need to nurture the talents of these young people and the Peace Poster Contest is one way for those who can see and express their vision of Peace through art, and the Essay Contest is a way for those whose actual vision may be limited, but their minds go beyond what we can see!

Now to the business:

Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest. The contest may be sponsored in a local school or organized, sponsored youth group, or individuals may be sponsored as well.

Peace Poster Contest-

Students ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15, 2021 are eligible to participate in the International Peace Poster Contest. Entries not meeting the following deadlines will be disqualified.

- October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- November 15: Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.
- December 1: Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.



- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 15:** Postmark deadline for the multiple district council chairperson to send one winning poster to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- February 1: International winners notified on or before this date.

Essay Contest Guidelines

Students who are visually impaired (according to their national guidelines), ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, 2021, are eligible to participate.

> November 15: Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.

Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays must be no longer than 500 words in length, submitted in English, typed in black ink and double-spaced. Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. (Available on the LCI website) Essays submitted without completed entry forms will be disgualified. Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student. Essay entries cannot have already been published. Any essays found to be plagiarized will be disqualified, and the student will be prohibited from entering any future Lions competitions.

Past International President and Chairperson of LCIF Gudrun focused on the benefit of grants which can be obtained from LCIF in all its global causes. She urged clubs to use this funding to support service activities.

One of the many highlights of the day was the address by Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Malala Yousafzai. Malala is leading the fight for a more equal world by increasing the number of children in school-specifically girls. She established the Malala Fund 's Education Champion Network which supports the work of educators and advocates and helps bolster girls ' secondary education around the world.

The 2021 LCI Humanitarian Award was announced as Professor Choi Youngsik of Busan, South Korea. Professor Youngsik has dedicated his entire career to education, medical innovation and research, volunteerism and helping others in need.



Day 5 The Last Day

In a variety of venues and forms throughout the convention, the



impact of the Lions Clubs International Foundation was highlighted. As well, donations to Campaign 100 were taken and at the end of the day, the final total donated to the Campaign since 2018 were an-

nounced - \$211,088,854!

Although Campaign 100, which started July 1, 2019, was to end on Jun 30, 2021, LCIF decided that because of COVID

The 2020 Humanitarian Award was also presented as neither a virtual nor in-person convention was held. It was received by Dr. Lee Gil Ya of Seoul, South Korea for her lifelong dedication to medical practice, education, social justice and humanitarian service throughout her country.



The LCI Humanitarian Award is the highest

award given to non-Lion individuals or organizations showing exemplary humanitarian efforts. It includes a grant from LCIF of up to \$250,000 for continuing humanitarian activities.

The history of LCI 's relationship with the United Nations was presented by International 2nd Vice President, Brian Sheehan. In 1945 Lions leaders were among representatives who met to established the non-governmental section of the United Nations. Lions Founder Melvin Jones was one of those leaders present. LCI threw support behind the new organization because the purposes of the UN agree thoroughly with the First Object of Lions International - peace around the world.




