

Pincher-Cowley Roaring Lions



Lions Club members donate necessary items to the Women 's Emergency Shelter in Pincher Creek The Pincher-Cowley Roaring Lions donate items twice a year as they recognize the shelter 's important and necessary role in the community providing women and their families a safe place when needed. The Pincher Creek Women 's Emergency Shelter (PCWESA) is an organization that provides a safe place for women and children who are experiencing family violence and/or crisis situations. It was officially registered as a non-profit organization in 1992 with the official opening of the building in 1997.

There are three programs available: Residential, Outreach, and a Child Support program. Their crisis line is available 24/7.

In 2020 PCWESA collected data from past and current clients to better understand service gaps within the organization. This was a



province wide initiative undertaken by 21 women 's shelters. The Alberta Council of Women 's Shelters accumulated this information- called Project Impact—and published a book containing the development of an evaluation tool that would help improve programming in the shelters. Each of the 21 shelters ' evaluation tool was specific to their needs.

Becoming a member of a Leo club benefits your community and


you. It endeavors to fill it with people who've decided to take action and serve others. Collectively, Lions & Leos make a global impact through their community service.

Lions Clubs New Zealand

In 1971, Ernest Adams, a Master baker living in New Zealand, created a

special Christmas cake recipe exclusive to Lions. The profits from the sale of these cakes go entirely to local charities in a club 's community—identified by each

club. Or , if preferred, the proceeds go to the Lions Clubs New Zealand Child Mobility Foundation which supports children who suffer from Cerebral Palsy, Spina Bifida or similar disabilities. And here 's a little more of the history:

"Ernest Adams was born in England in 1892, the son of a Master baker. In 1912 he emigrated to Melbourne and then to Christchurch. In 1921 he partnered up with an elderly baker named Hugh Bruce and in 1930 their bakeries adopted the name Ernest Adams Ltd. For decades cakes from Ernest Adams bakeries have



been the go-to sweet for many social gatherings. However, in 2000 the Bakery was sold to a Hong Kong/Singapore bread company. Because of poor product reviews, cakes under the name Ernest Adams have disappeared from the marketplace. "

However—the Lions Clubs of New Zealand continue to own this original recipe developed in 1971. Sales of the Lions Christmas Cakes are eagerly awaited with community charities the recipients of much needed funds.



Billericay Lions, United Kingdom "Ordinary People Doing Amazing Things"

From December 10th to 23rd, the Billericay Lions Christmas Sleigh will be making their Christmas collection runs to residents door to door. During this time, Santa and his elves will visit around the community on 10 nights. A website is set up containing all the routes with the dates and approximate times the sleigh will arrive.

Many local organizations provide assistance to make this Christmas Sleigh happen—a tow car, batteries to light the sleigh, candies for the children, to name a few. Funds collected are distributed by the Lions club to local charities.

Members of the North Hill club have been taking part in the Salvation Army 's Kettle Program for a number of years. It is one of the club 's main activities during the Christmas season.

On Saturday, November 26th, members were at Market Mall in Calgary ringing the bells reminding busy shoppers of the increasing need of many families to obtain assistance with food, clothing and other necessities. The Salvation Army also adds gifts for the family so that no one goes without some small present at Christmas.

Kettles that have volunteers beside them bring in an average of \$220 per 2-hour shift. This \$220 allows the Salvation Army to provide 20 emergency food hampers; complete tax returns of 8 clients; provide 4 children with toy hampers; feed 20 individuals at the shelter; provide 3 children with backpacks & school supplies; give 15 pairs of thermal socks to clients; send 2 children to Pine Lake camp; build 15 hygiene packs; and provide 20 adults with transit tickets to attend ESL classes.

Thanks to this year 's Kettle Campaign volunteers Lions Blaine (organizer), Darryl, Denise, Bill, Doug, Cindy, Jack and Shirley.

Christmas Hampers

Each year the club provides \$5,000 to the program under the guidance of Committee Chair Lion Denise. Through the EvenStart for Children 's Foundation, 5 families of children who have come through a background of trauma are provided with a Christmas Hamper. Lion Denise organizes shoppers for each of the hampers and with \$1,000, they scour for the best deals on items listed on a gift list provided by each family to EvenStart. The hampers will contain necessities as well as a grocery gift card. In total, around 200 families receive hampers through EvenStart.



The Creation of Rudolf

Robert L. May created Rudolph in 1939, when his company, the Montgomery Ward department stores, asked him to write a Christmas story that they could give away to customers. Drawing on the tale of "The Ugly Duckling," Mr. May penned the story of a sweet, homely reindeer shunned because of his glowing red nose. Little did he know his creation was destined to become a Christmas holiday classic. Over the next few years, the company distributed millions of copies of *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer*. The book 's copyright was transferred to Mr. May in 1947, and under his ownership, Rudolph 's popularity soared. Commercial printings and cartoons quickly followed, and then, of course, came the song, which secured Rudolph 's place in Christmas history, and in our hearts, forever. Robert L. May died in 1976.

"Grateful For All That You Do"



Greetings to all of you Invested in Service Lions! I extend greetings from the CLERC executive and a boatload of gratitude for all that you personally do for CLERC and for all the efforts on our behalf that your Lions Club does.

I would like to start out by laying

out a few statistics for you.

*WHO states that there 320 million visually impaired

- people in the world who require eyewear
- * 45 Million people suffer from blindness
- * 1 person goes blind every 5 seconds
- * 1.4 Million children under the age of 15 are blind
- * Cataracts are the #1 cause of blindness
- * Lions have enabled 3.5 million cataract surgeries world wide
- * Lions have financed the building of over 150 eye hospitals
- * Today there are nearly 1.5 million Lions engaged in a global campaign to eliminate preventable blindness

By now many of you are familiar with the processing journey that a pair of glasses take before they land on a face of a recipient. Sorted in to type, sterilized, hand dried, read on a Lens meter, packaged and sent off to an Outreach group.

A brief history of CLERC operations in the last 10 years: We had no warehouse, every eyeglass work party was held at various locations and we had to manually move every box, piece of equipment in to a building bi weekly. In year one we processed 58,800 glasses. With an operational warehouse, In pre-covid times that number has swollen to 400,000+ several years in a row. During the last 2 pandemic years, CLERC managed to process close to 300,000 pair a year. To date, you efforts as Lions have allowed over 6.5 million people in 103 countries to enjoy the benefits of clear vision from our Canadian LERS. Besides Lions, other contributors have gotten involved in the process. BP & Imperial Oil annuits, Boy Scouts, Church Groups and Leo Clubs have all stepped up for the At CLERC we compliment all Lions Clubs for being cause. CLERC continues to support an eyeglass workshop at the CCC where inmates perform all aspects of the operation and have 4 lens meters to read prescriptions. CLERC also opened a subsidiary in Bishop Falls Correctional Centre, NFLD that is accountable to CLERC and run by the Lions of District N-3 & 4.

There are 19 LERS worldwide. Twelve are located in the USA and one in Spain, France, Italy, Australia, Israel and South Africa. Together LERS place over 4.5 Million pairs a year on faces in 3rd World countries globally. CLERC is renowned for exporting quality, clean and accurately read eyewear by the Outreach Groups that source glasses.

In the past 10 years CLERC has prioritized updating all aspects of the program, from purchasing new age lens meters that hasten the process and are easier to operate, to updating our logo. We have also been building a Canada-wide database that lists drop off sites and Lions Club pick up contacts. If you are picking up glasses please send us your locations and contacts at www.CLERC.ca. CLERC has also added a Homepage, a FB account and we regularly contribute to Lions of Canada FB page and also to District C-1 's own Dr. Patt Hill 's International FB site. Another new concept is that CLERC now holds quarterly Zoom meetings with the Collection Chairs from each province to find out their needs, communicate and deliver program updates and find out where we can streamline the process to make it easier for them.

A lot has changed in part thanks to the computer age. What hasn 't changed is that YOUR efforts on our behalf are the backbone of CLERC 's success as a Canadian Lions Initiative.

CLERC is funded through the donations received from Lions Clubs, and a Casino that we get every 2 years . Our balance sheet tells us that it costs \$4500 per month before we even open the doors. That figure only pays the rent, vehicle maintenance and licensing, internet and utilities. Packaging, equipment maintenance are an additional expense. A breakdown of donations received from Lions Clubs tells a story that needs a new ending. As a multi district, Canada wide program, our income is sourced by the following :

- * RESPECS 18.4%
- * Casino 49.3%
- * District C-2 Club donations 27.2%
- * The rest of Canada 5.1%

Changes Are Coming!

Lions Clubs International are calling it "Evolving Our Digital Experience". And the changes are designed to make entering clubs service and membership activities on the website more user friendly.

This will be the latest update on the platform where Lions clubs enter their Service and Membership information into MyLCI and MyLion. It is called the Lion Portal.

The Lion Portal is what will appear after a user signs in to their LCI account. The new arrangement is presently being tested throughout the Lions world in order to receive constructive feedback. Surveys and panels are also taking place to receive the most information about the new user experience. This new Portal is built on Salesforce, a commercially available platform used by over 150,000 organizations.

MyLion, MyLCI and Insights will be combined into the Lion Portal so that the process for entering service and membership works the same way regardless of what you wish to do. The plans are to introduce this new "experience" later in 2023.

International President Brian Sheehan has made a short video on these changes. It can be found on the LCI website under Resources For Members.

In the meantime...

If you are having problems entering into MyLCI or MyLion, there are a number of resources you can access.

First-your Zone Chair should be able to assist or have a speaker at your next Zone meeting who will answer all questions.

Second - the Global Membership Team Leader for C-2 is Lion Henry Czarnoda. He will gladly help you make your entries and give you helpful tips on how to make your use of MyLion and MyLCI more successful. Lion Henry can be reached at czarnoda@telus.net.

Third, LCI has a contact number if you are having technical difficulties with your account. They generally either return your telephone call or email within a few days.

Don 't struggle on your own. These Lion resources are for your benefit so that your club information is up to date.

PSST! Wanna Know a Secret?



Did you know that Lions are the best kept secret in the world? – Yup – but let me tell you another secret – we are not going to be a secret much longer!

Last week (mid November) several members of Lions Clubs in Canada went to Ottawa and after some

intense training and brainstorming, we met with various Members of Parliament and told them about Lions. One of the first things we had to be aware of and respectful of, was the time and attention the MPs gave us for these meetings. What did we want? MPs always have people asking for something! But we had a slightly different angle.

This was our mandate: 1. Raise awareness of Lions Clubs of Canada among Parliamentarians and the federal government. 2. Demonstrate Lions Clubs ' impact on their communities across Canada and 3. Ensure Lions are recognized as essential partner of the Government of Canada.

Some of the Members of Parliament we met had heard about Lions – many had not – but we had a message that was, overall very well received. Our message surprised them because we really weren 't asking for much – we were asking for recognition of the fact that Lions Clubs provide essential services in our communities and around the world. Not only do we know what is going on in our communities, we know what 'our' community needs and that we are there to serve – you know the saying: Where there is a need, there is a Lion. – And here we are.

Many MPs were familiar with the community service that

Lions in their constituency provide - pancake breakfast, carnivals, supporting kids sports, eyeglass collection etc., but they didn 't know the full scope of what we as Lions are capable of with the support of the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF. We explained that Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF is a registered charity and that because of some wise investing when the Foundation was created to cover any administrative expenses, 100% of the funds received from the public, goes back to the public in the service provided. An important component in our meetings was explaining how we can do so much more through the Foundation - When a disaster hits an area, because Lions LIVE there, various grants are available for an emergency response - but more importantly, we are there for the rebuilding AFTER the disaster – and again, various grants are available. We weren 't asking for direct government funding for the emergency relief or for the rebuilding – we are able to use the money from LCIF - received from the public. BUT what we are asking for is that when the Government offers to match dollars for donation made to other organisations like they did for Hurricane Fiona most recently - we are asking that the Government matches the dollars for donations made to Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF.

If you have heard the term 'Global Advocacy' – that 's no secret – we are trying to reveal the secret about Lions – and how we provide essential service to make our communities – and our country Canada – a better place for us to all live.

This visit to Ottawa was the first "Lions Day at Parliament" and it is hoped it will become an annual event.

A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens was released during the Christmas season of 1843. Although its high production cost and low selling price did not bring in a lot of profits, it was an immediate success and it made a permanent mark on how Christmas is viewed and celebrated in modern times.

The vocabulary has crept into today's conversations, with a "Scrooge" being someone who refuses to get in the holiday spirit, and "Tiny Tim" being any innocent in a vulnerable situation. Most importantly, every time this piece of literature is read or displayed on the silver screen, it reminds us of a vision of Christmas that has little to do with displays of wealth, and instead focuses on loved ones and the joy in an act of charity.

Dickens wrote this ghostly tale for the most part as a commentary on the social injustices of the time - low wages, poor working conditions and child labour. He felt that a story would have more impact on spotlighting these issues than merely statements and editorials.
