Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides receives NO funding from the Government.

It 's your help that ensures these matches can continue in the future. LFOC Dog Guides focus on seven areas, vision, hearing, diabetic alert, autism assistance, service and seizure response. They have also recently introduced the Facility Support dogs, used by professional agencies with individuals in traumatic situations. At a cost north of \$35,000 each to train and match these dogs, it 's easy to see where and why the money is needed. I hope you 'll add Dog Guides to your Clubs and personal giving list. I 'm really looking forward to visiting the Dog Guide Training facility in Oakville, Ont. later this month. How many puppies can you fit in a suitcase??

Many Kinds of Club Memberships

"New memberships should be at the top of mind for all clubs."

Does your club allow or even realize that they can have many different membership types in your club?

Lions Clubs International allows various types of memberships. The following is just some of the categories available, these can be used when discussing membership and

recruitment of new members.

New Membership should be top of mind for all our clubs. Is it on your meeting agenda? It should be, and it would only take five minutes of meeting time. Have the membership committee use this time to ask for referrals from your members. If you do this you should have continuous supply of recruits.

Regular Membership

The most common membership type. Our 1.3 million members in more than 47,000 clubs all over the world work to better their communities and fight for Lions Clubs International's global causes.

Family

Allows relatives living in the same house to volunteer together at a reduced dues rate. Children cannot become members, but can participate in the Cub Program, which allows children under age 12 the opportunity to build a lifelong dedication to helping others.

Student

Students between who are enrolled in an educational institution, and are between their country's legal age of majority and under 30, are eligible to receive a discount on international dues. This is a great option for members of Campus Clubs!

Leo

Young people interested in Lions International may become Leos as part of a Leo Club.

Leo-Lion

Leo-Lion members are former Leos who have joined the larger Lions organization. This membership type provides current or former Leos, who are of their country's age of legal majority through age 35, the opportunity to transition from Leos to Lions while receiving a discount on dues and other benefits.

The By-laws Effect

How modifications changed LCI world-wide

Two major changes to Lions Clubs International Constitution & By-Laws made a difference.

Today men & women

can join Lions Clubs International world wide. We have Lions Clubs in 220 countries and geographic areas. Lions Clubs International have 1.4 million members. In 2018 Lions Clubs International elected Lion Gudrun Yngvadottir from Iceland to be the first female International President. At the 105th International Convention held in Boston, Massachusetts July 2023, Lion Dr. Patti Hill from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada will be the second female International President. All of this could not have happened without the major changes to the Lions Clubs International Constitution and By-Laws.

The first major change to Lions Club International Constitution & By-Laws took place at the tenth International Convention held in San Francisco, California in 1926. All the delegates at the 10th International Convention voted unanimously to removed the word "white" from the membership qualifications. Thus, all men & women of colour world wide can join Lions Clubs International.

In 1917, in their first year, there were no gender restrictions for membership. In 1918, the word "male" was

inserted in the Constitution and By-Laws.

In the early 1926 the Pan-Pacific Lions Club was granted a provisional Charter from Lions Clubs International, whose members were of diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds. Two months before the 1926 International Convention, Lion Kurokawa, assisted by Lion Charley Lewis of Long Beach California visited 21 Lions Clubs from San Diego to Vancouver and promoted the removal of the word "white" from the International Constitution. They were successful at the 10th International Convention as Lions Clubs International granted the Pan-Pacific Lions Club a full Charter. In 1933, the Pan-Pacific Lions Club changed their name to the Honolulu Lions Club. In 2026 Lions Clubs International will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of this Constitution and By-laws change.

The second major change to Lions Clubs International Constitution and By-Laws took place in the mid 1980s. A group of women from the United States decided to take Lions Clubs International and other organizations to court asking these groups to allow women to join. Lions Clubs International decided to fight these women in court but subsequently decided to stop as it became too expensive to continue. At the 70th Lions Clubs International Convention held in Taipei, Taiwan, in 1987 the delegates voted successfully to remove the word "male" from the Constitution and By-laws. Thus, allowing any person to join Lions Clubs International.

Before the change, Lions Clubs International had the Lioness Clubs, which were the wives or companions of Lion members. They elect their own officers, have their own meetings, and assist their Lions Club in their many projects. They faded out when Lions Clubs International introduced the Lioness Clubs Program.

Lioness Clubs must be sponsored by a Lions Club. Many Lioness Clubs asked their Lions Clubs to sponsor them to be a Lioness Club and were successful. Only a few Lioness Clubs may be still operating today. The Lioness Clubs members may be the wives or companions of Lions members or any women. They elect their own officers, have their own meetings and raise funds to do their own projects. They also assist their sponsoring Lions Club in their projects.

After the change to the Lions Clubs International Constitution and By-Laws in 1987, many Lioness Clubs applied and received their Lions Club Charter. Members from Lioness Clubs applied to their sponsoring Lions Clubs or other Lions Clubs to be Lions Club members and were accepted. Only a few Lioness Clubs may be still operating today.

At the beginning many Lions did not accept the change and left the organization. As time goes on, nearly all the Lions Clubs became co-ed. With the added new members, each Lions Club become stronger and are able to do more projects. Only a few Lions Clubs with all male or all female members may be still operating today.
