Message from 2022-2023 District Governor Darryl Rawleigh

Welcome to another Lionistic year.

International President Brian Sheehan 's motto is "Together we Can". I want our clubs to build on this and add "Together we Will". Smaller Clubs are struggling to get enough members to do meaningful projects in their communities. As Lions, we are one big family. No individual club is better than another, lets eliminate the politics. Help one another for the good of your communities and Lions overall.

COVID still hangs over our heads, but things are getting back to a new normal. Please respect individuals ' personal beliefs and use acceptable COVID protocol.

The District Governor Team has established very conservative goals for this year:

Service Reporting – We hope to have 64 % of clubs reporting service on "MyLCI". Any member can report service, but it must be approved by the Club President or Secretary to show up on the club matrix.

Membership Growth – We ask each club to have a net growth of one member. But don 't stop at one. There is strength in numbers, more Lions allows the workload to be shared.

New Clubs – We aim to get 2 new clubs or Branch clubs in District C-2.

Monthly Membership Reports (MMR) – This is vital for us to prepare budgets etc. It is important to Report all new Members, Drop deceased members and members who are no longer active or have been dropped for various reasons. We ask

that clubs review the information for each member to ensure accuracy. Lions Clubs International (LCI) and your district need this information. Email addresses for Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers is absolutely necessary.

To assist your club with the reporting, you can appoint a Club Administrator, who has access to "My LCI" to make the required changes and do monthly reporting. Many Clubs are breaking down the Secretary's position into 2 positions. One is the recording and correspondence and the other does all computer and reporting work.

We can 't forget our International Foundation and causes-Vision, Diabetes, Hunger, Childhood Cancer, and Environment. Your continued club and individual support is required to carry on these important activities.

Each year the District Governor choses a district or national charity to have clubs support. Lions Foundation of Canada (LFC) recently announced a program to raise 25 million dollars to build a much needed new training facility. For this reason, I have chosen Lions Foundation of Canada "Dog Guides-Building Fund" as my designated charity/project.

Okotoks Lions Club

Lions generosity stretches all the way to the Philippines

The Okotoks Lions Club has stepped up to help a young woman in the Philippines regain her lost sight. The local service club, at the urging of member Bill Stell (below right), has pledged up to \$1,500 to cover the cost of cataract surgery for Theresa, a 29 year-old who was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa when she was a teenager (left).

With one eye virtually blind and a cataract impairing the other, the 29 year-old now requires surgery to preserve what vision she has left.

Theresa was scheduled to make the two hour trek to see the surgeon this month (June), and, if all goes well, schedule a date for the operation. Stell said that the cataract surgery and lens implant will prevent further deterioration of sight in her stronger eye and provide improved vision for years to come but added that it is difficult to say how long that improvement will last.

experience for both the child and their family.








Lions Train Ride & BBQ

🕻 Canmore Lions Club

In March 2019 the Lions Club of Canmore held an eye clinic in Guatemala with the Hearts and Hands Foundation, also of Canmore. The project was a partnership between Hearts and Hands Foundation, the municipality of San Andres Sajacabaja, Guatemala, and the Lions Clubs of Canmore and Santa Cruz del Quiche, Guatemala.

The eyeglasses were donated to the Canmore Club from the CLERC program. Two ophthalmologists of the Santa Cruz Club donated their time and equipment for testing patients 'eyesight. Both adults and children were seen over

a two-day clinic. For those that needed prescription glasses, the two ophthalmologists saw them later in their clinics at no cost. The clinic was managed by Dave Williams and Jan Townsend, two members of the Canmore Club, and Rebeca Galindo a staff member of Hearts and Hands.

Hearts and Hands Foundation has worked in Guatemala since 2004. The Foundation has held a medical clinic,12 dental clinics, and an eye clinic. The Foundation works in very rural and remote towns where families are very poor, are subsistence farmers, and have an income of less than two dollars a day. The area is remote and at a high altitude. The sun is hot and eyes suffer from the bright sun light. Many have glaucoma and women suf-

fer from poor eyesight or blindness from making handicrafts to sell at the market. The response to the clinic was fantastic.

The patients began lining up very early in the morning and sat patiently waiting their turn. The project also had the assistance of volunteers from the local Women 's Centre who acted as translators and supervising the patient process.



The joy for us was when patients were fitted with glasses and they could see better. Especially for the children who had never seen well. All loved choosing a specific pair of glasses they liked amongst all the selection we had on display. It was like ten Christmases rolled into one when they selected a pair. My eyes filled many times when a very senior person with new glasses could see. Many had never had their eyes tested or had been seen by an eye doctor. Many were getting their first pair of glasses.

The experience was so rewarding and it was such a privilege to be

able improve the quality of lives of so many people of all ages. The gratitude expressed by the patients and the smiles on their faces was all the reward we needed. We knew we had to provide another clinic in the future.



Unfortunately, COVID-19 intervened. Finally two and one- half years later, Hearts and Hands and the Canmore and Santa Cruz Lions Clubs will be holding another eye clinic in San Andres Sajacabaja from November 9 to 22, 2022. Volunteers from Canmore, Calgary, Ottawa, Turner Valley, and Sidney B.C. will be working in a dental clinic, an eye clinic, building stoves in Mayan homes, and installing solar lights in homes without electricity.

Breslau, Ontario this past June. What an amazing experience to witness the trainers working with the prospective Dog Guides in the seven different programs offered by Lions Foundation of Canada. The first Dog Guide you think of is vision, but Lions Foundation of Canada also offers Dog Guides for hearing, service, diabetic alert, seizure response, autism assistance and facility support. Even with the trainers back at it full time after Covid, the waiting list for any one of the Dog Guides continues to grow. If you don 't already receive the "Paws For Thought" newsletter, look up the Lions Foundation of Canada webpage, www.dogguides.com, and you 'II read all about the need for these wonderful dogs, the change they have made in people 's lives, and the many programs your Club could help support to make this program possible.

Very soon, you 'II be hearing about a Capital Campaign for Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides- "The Difference Campaign". The need for a new and much larger training facility has become a reality. While at the training facility in June, I witnessed dogs being trained in meeting rooms, hall-

ways, parking lots, etc., because the existing facility is too small to meet the demands of the program. I saw dogs being taken out to play and get exercise, in an area no bigger than a two car

garage because there is just no more room. The other reason for the expansion, is to increase the breeding program which will increase the number of trained Dog Guides, which will increase the number of matches for people with medical or physical disabilities, which will change the lives of more people all across Canada, because the Lions across Canada stepped up and supported The Difference Campaign. The goal is to raise \$25 million dollars and have a new facility up and running by 2025. A huge goal, but I know we can all make it happen because Where There 's a Need, There 's a Lion!

Another way to support the program and honour a Club or Community member, is by donating towards a Judge Brian Stevenson Fellowship, meant to recognize outstanding Lions and other deserving recipients. deserving person.







The Beginning of the Lions Youth Camp Cremona

District Governor Dave Deitz (1979-1980) had an idea to create a camp to be used by scouts,



families, and Lions Clubs. His camp idea came into reality in the early eighties when

Lion Lionel Bird, Cremona Lions Club, donated the land from his farm near Cremona, Alberta, to make this dream a reality.

From a previous Lions Telethon, \$50,000 was put in trust with LOAF (Lions of Alberta Foundation) for the development of the project. Only the interest can be used annually—the capital cannot be withdrawn. It took 3 years to install new roads, pathways, water

and sewage, recreation areas and buildings. With the help of countless Lions who worked many hours and donations from the Lions Clubs of then District 37E, the Lions Youth Camp opened in the spring of 1985.

When opened, the camp consisted of 8 cabins each with 8 bunk beds, an Atco washroom and shower unit, and Atco industrial kitchen trailer, an indoor recreation Sprung structure, a Quonset for supplies, and a baseball diamond.

In 1989 the Lions Youth Camp committee decided to build a new kitchen and indoor recreation area. The Sprung structure was sold and the trailer, without the kitchen, was donated to a

local family whose house was destroyed by fire. In 1990 the new kitchen and indoor recreation building were opened. In the late 1990s, the Atco washroom and shower outgrew its needs. The Cal-

gary North Hill Lions donated funds to build a new washroom and shower building which continues in use today. Funding for

a new cabin was also donated. In the 2000s, the roads and pathways were paved for handicapped campers and a new paved pad for recreation was also developed. In 2008 a Bunk House with 24 beds was constructed.

The Youth Camp Committee decided to honour Lion Lionel Bird for his outstanding service with an Award named after him. Lions Clubs, districts, individuals and multiple dis-

tricts that donate \$500 have access to this award. Detailed information on this and all information on the Camp can be found on the Youth Camp website (see below).

As the Camp 's funding comes only from the Lionel Bird Award, interest from the trust account, rentals, and Casinos, there is always a need for donations. Lions Clubs are encouraged to donate funds annually to the camp for maintenance and improvements. A Camp clean-up is scheduled each spring and is heartily accomplished by Lion volunteers.

The Forest surrounds a court yard with a central globe and seating. As well, a gazebo has been built at the edge of the park with seating for use for services and visits.

Originally the Memorial Forest was hoped to be supported by District C-1 as well. However as that has not happened, Lion Henry is proposing that the name of the Forest contain the words "Lions of Southern Alberta".



District Governor 's Advisory Committee

The Zone Chairs make up the DG 's Advisory Committee.

Zone Chairs are the conduit between Clubs, the District, and Lions Clubs International. Clubs in each Zone are to meet at least 3 times per year. Now, with the increased use of technology, Zone Chairs can connect with their clubs via email as well as Zoom in order to fulfill their duties.

Our District Global Action Team 2022-2023



The Global Action Team (GAT) structure is a "bottoms up " approach to support clubs.

It is a bridge between

Lions and the international association. It is especially designed to connect clubs, districts and leaders to resources which will improve their service impact.

Developing Service Impact are the key goals in this program.

The GAT began as a series of separate teams - the Global Membership Team

Leadership Team (GLT) established in 2010; and, the Global Service Team (GST) established in 2017. These three teams were united in 2017 to form the Global Action Team.

The goal of the GAT is to create a unified approach to action in Service, Membership, Leadership, and LCIF.


Each club president is automatically the club 's Global Action Team club chairperson. This chairperson reports directly to the GAT district chairperson - the district governor.

(GMT) established in 2008; the Global At the district level, the district governor is automatically the GAT district chairperson. Under the district governor are the GLT. GST. and GMT coordinators appointed by the district governor. Depending on the constitution and bylaws of the district, the appointments can be from one to three years.

> The Multiple District Council Chair is automatically the GAT MD chairperson and appoints the MDC GLT, GST, and GMT chairpersons.

Past International President's Perspicacious Perspective

The 104^{th} International Convention was held in Montreal, Canada from June 24-28, 2022. It was the third time that Lions from around the world gathered in that great cosmopolitan city. The first time Montreal hosted this global gathering was in 1979 (62^{nd}), and again in 1996 (79^{th}).

As usual, the Lions of MD "U" (Quebec) did a superb job of welcoming members of our global family. The theme adopted by the Host Committee was "Rise Together", reflecting the hope that the Covid-19 pandemic was coming to an end, and the unified resumption of our service efforts was at hand.

The attendance was less than anticipated for a variety of reasons, the prime one being huge delays in obtaining visas for our members resident in nations where visas to enter Canada are required, and challenges recurring at the Canadian border. Our headquarters is aware that hundreds planning to attend were unable to obtain their visas, and the border issues – real or imagined – caused many to cancel their registrations.

Nonetheless, a warm welcome was extended to everyone by Valerie Plante, the Mayor. A portion of her welcome was:

"As you know, the Lions' motto is "We Serve". From saving sight to reducing the prevalence of diabetes and responding when disaster strikes, Lions Clubs International continues to improve the lives of countless individuals around the globe. With the events of the past two years, the mission of service is more relevant than ever. So please keep going!"

"But whether you're joining in person or virtually, we also

hope that you have plenty of opportunities to build new relationships and envision new projects, the type of projects that will ripple out in the world and promote kindness."

The Convention venues primarily took place on levels 2, 5 and 7 of the "Palais des Congres de Montreal", with the International Show and the three Plenary Sessions in the "Bell Centre". Shuttle bus service was provided to take delegates from their hotels to those two locations.

On Friday, June 24, at the Palais, the Exhibit Hall opened, with LCI and LCIF HQ Division staff present to respond to any questions, as well as two stages for "Campfire Sessions" and "Lions Den" presentations on various service projects being conducted by Lions from around the world. There were specific presentations on social media, Special Olympics, and a welcoming of runners from Ukraine, Poland and Germany who completed a 1700 kilometer run from LCI Headquarters in Oak Brook, Illinois to Montreal.

On Saturday, June 25, the International Parade of Nations was held in the city center, and Montreal citizens were treated to Lions from 213 nations and geographic areas marching for just under a mile in their national dress proudly displaying their national flag and MD and District locations.

Following the International Parade, there were sessions for our District Governors-Elect on "Managing Your District". In the evening, the International Show featured legendary entertainer Smokey Robinson at the Bell Centre.

On Sunday, June 26, the First Plenary Session was held at the Bell Centre. International President Alexander reported on the 2021-2022 year.

In addition to live music from the LCICon2022 house band, Shine, and singer Floyd Smith of the 5th Dimension, the flags of all LCI nations were presented, and the delegates heard nominations for candidates for International Director and International Third Vice President.

Following the close of the first Plenary Session, LCIF held their annual Melvin Jones Fellow Luncheon at the Palais, and for the balance of the day sessions were held for Leos and Leo-Lions, Increasing Your Service Impact, the use of Social Media to promote Lions and our service, Specialty Clubs, Liability Insurance, global membership, LCIF grants, Lions Quest, and an opportunity to meet the winner of this year's International Peace Poster Contest.

On Monday, June 27, beginning at 9:30 AM, the Second Plenary Session was held at the Bell Centre.

Following music performances to start things off, delegates heard an inspiring address from Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, the first female President of Liberia. After her address, LCIF made a special presentation, and the delegates heard remarks from this year's Humanitarian Award recipient Namibian ophthalmologist Dr. Helena Ndume.

Following the adjournment of the Second Plenary Session, many of the previous day 's seminars were repeated, plus sessions on Achieving Club Excellence, Marketing Matters: Take Your Promotions to the Next Level, the Vital Importance of Reporting Your Club Activities to LCI, the New Voices Initiative, Our Global Strategies for the Future of Lions and Leos, and a Zone Chairpersons Seminar.

On Tuesday, June 28, the Third and Final Plenary Session was held at the Bell Centre.

Following musical performances, the results of Campaign 100 were announced – US\$ 324.7 million – US\$ 24.7 million more than our goal! Our new International President Lion Brian Sheehan from the USA was formally installed, the election results were announced, and all District Governors-Elect gave their Oath of Office and were proclaimed to be now in office.

The 104th Lions Clubs International Convention was then adjourned by International President Sheehan.


