## **Brown Bagging for Calgary Kids**

On September 19, 2023, the Calgary Heritage Lions Club (CHLC) participated in the Brown Bagging For Calgary's Kids (BB4CK) preparation of energy balls for their meal packages. BB4CK is a community funded group that has a school lunch and snack program for about 6500 kids out of a school population of about 200,000 identified by school personnel as coming from families that experience food insecurity. The need is identified by school teachers since the families typically are reluctant to ask for such aid. BB4CK has morning sessions in which volunteers assist in meal preparation but

now also has an afternoon program to prepare additional, nourishing treats to be included in the lunches displacing

some that would otherwise be purchased. The CHLC participated in one of these afternoon programs where 689 energy balls were prepared. The energy balls consisted of oatmeal, honey, peanut butter, ground flaxseed and chocolate chips. Attending club members included Lions Charles Echlin, Ivan Hardman, George Loewen, Sandy Milne, Ravinder Sierra, Ron Sinkinson, Bill Stecewicz and Bob Weller. Additionally, Otto Silzer of the Lions Club of Calgary and his wife Clara participated. Their assistance in our club's initiative allowed us to expand BB4CK's minimum size team and was greatly



appreciated. The CHLC has made previous contributions of time and money to this worthy cause.



### **New Freezer**

Recently, the Heritage Lions Club contributed \$4500 for a second reach-in freezer to accommodate BB4CK's growing need. ## The "Yule" Log Has a Very Long History



As with many ancient traditions the beginnings of the Yule Log custom lay covered in the shadows of time. However, it is known that the ancient Vikings used a "Yule" log in their celebrations of the winter solstice. It was thought that burning the log on the shortest and darkest day of the year would drive away any evil spirits that were lurking, bring good luck to the people of the area, and welcome the sun back to the skies. No doubt, the Vikings adapted this custom from earlier civilizations.

As time passed, variations and modifications of the "Yule" log's inclusion in December celebrations took place. The custom spread to the Americas mainly from Britian where the log was brought into the house on Christmas Eve and burned for 12 days. This burning time gradually decreased to a much shorter period. Today, guests arriving at a Christmas Eve dinner often bring a "Yule" log as an offering of good luck and prosperity to the presenters of the feast.

## Season's Greetings and A Prayer For Peace



As 2023 draws to a close on a troubled world, we all hope for a cessation of hostilities wherever they exist anywhere on our planet. We who are members of Lions Clubs International, the largest service club organization in the world, all pray that PEACE will become a reality for all peo-

ple in the coming year.

On March 14, 1988, when I was honored to serve as International President, I was privileged to address delegates at the United Nations at their headquarters in New York on our annual "Lion's Day at the U.N."

My closing remarks reflect one of our organization's most important objectives - "to create and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world". I shared with the delegates some words from Canadian astronaut Marc Garneau, who was able to widen his horizon far beyond the dreams of most of us - to view our planet in its entirety from the awesome perspective of outer space.

He was asked to write an essay for a book called "What Peace Means To Me", published to help celebrate the United Nations International Year of Peace in 1986. Here are some of his thoughts on seeing earth from the vantage point of an orbiting space shuttle:

"Distinctions such as race, religion and nationality are lost on you as you glide smoothly over the earth's surface with no visible boundaries to remind you that any of us are different, or that we want to segregate ourselves from each other. It just isn't important anymore. Down below is earth, home, and every human being walking upon that earth is your fellow human being. Every spot below you is equally inviting from your perspective high above it. Here is a perspective which makes

you want to cry out for peace. Here is a perspective which makes you realize just how precious human life really is. Is peace achievable? I really don't know. Should we go for it? Harder than ever!"

As Dr. Patti Hill, our International President states, for good reason, that for 106 years we Lions have been "Changing the World" - one person at a time - one community at a time - one relationship at a time.

We believe that Peace means much more than just the absence of war, or the silencing of the sounds of conflict.

We know that over those 106 years we Lions have vigorously attacked the enormous problems of inadequacy throughout the world - inadequacy of shelter, inadequacy of water, inadequacy of education, inadequacy of literacy, inadequacy of medical treatment and facilities, inadequacy of family life, inadequacy of social conscience.

By doing that, we strengthen our international resolve that the pursuit of true peace must include a recognition of the common dignity of all people in our global society.

As you know, Lions are not, as a world organization, champions of any ideology or political philosophy. We do not carry any brief for any particular religious faith. By our Objects, by our Ethics, by our traditions, by our service activities for more than a century, we are simply Champions of Mankind.

I am so proud to be a Lion, and I know you all join me in continuing to do our very best, individually and with our fellow Lions, to foster PEACE as we Change the World.

man voice encouraged the British to join them out of their trenches into the area known as the "No Man's Land". The result was an evening of kind words, songs, and the trading of wine and tobacco.

Apparently there are accounts of similar truces that took place on other battlefields along the Western Front. As one soldier remarked "there was not an atom of hate on either side".

### Helen Keller's "First" Christmas

In 1891, when Helen Keller was 19 months old, she contracted a high fever that left her deaf, blind, and unable to learn to speak. Her first six Christmases had been dark silent days, like all days were for her. In her seventh year, light arrived in the form of her teacher, Anne Sullivan, whom Helen called Teacher. So did words, tapped onto hands.

The first Christmas Helen could comprehend took place in her seventh year, though she could not see it or hear it, of course. Through tapping, she discovered that trees "grew" in parlors in December. On Christmas Eve, she was invited to a party and was happy children played with her. Her mother wept and gave thanks. Helen woke her family the next morning, frantically spelling, "Merry Christmas! Merry Christmas!"

Helen learned, too, the concept of gifts. She was invited to several more parties with other children. Anne Sullivan wrote, "At a party at the local school, Helen was given the honor of distributing gifts. After handing them out, she noticed that one little girl, Nellie, received fewer gifts than the others. She signed to Teacher: "I will give Nellie mug."

Anne later wrote, "She had chosen to give the gift which pleased her most to a girl she barely knew. Years later, Helen recalled, though she was "blind, deaf and speechless" (her description), she loved collecting and preparing "orange and lemon peel, citron, nuts, apples, currants and raisins" to make fruitcakes with the family at Christmastime. To her, these cakes were "miracles."

Helen wrote, "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched — they must be felt with the heart." We might all remember that on holy days — and every day — of the year.



## Voting at the C-2 Convention February 9/10

### There will be voting on the following:

District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, 2nd Vice District Governor for 2024-2025 Multiple District C Vice Council Chair for 2024-2025 Hall of Fame - 2 recipients

Electronic voting will take place at the Convention on Saturday, February 10th, 2024.

### Who votes?

Each club has a predetermined number of voting delegates.

The number of voting delegates is based on the number of club members as of January 1st, 2024.

The members counted must be a member for at least 1 year and a day.

Club must have paid its dues to the District, Multiple District and LCI.

### Here are the rules from the Constitution.

"Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district (single or sub and multiple) shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district (single or sub and multiple) to one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate for each ten (10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held. The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five (5) or more members. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one (1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one (1) vote only on each question submitted to, the respective convention. Unless otherwise specified herein, the affirmative vote of a majority of the delegates voting on any question shall be the act of the convention. All eligible delegates must be members in good standing of a club in good standing in this district and must be in possession of a valid Lions Clubs International membership card, showing they are in good standing. Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired up to 15 days prior to the close of credential certification, as such closing time shall be established by the rules of the respective convention."

### **Past District Governors**

All past and present District Governors are voting delegates over and above the club's quota.

Their clubs must be in good standing with the District C-2.

The past and present District Governors must be in possession of a current, valid LCI membership card.

## December 26th, 2023

The deadline for any candidates running for office and Hall of Fame.

## **January 15th, 2024**

## LATEST NEWS FROM LIONS INTERNATIONAL

Change on how voting delegate number is determined.

As you may be aware, a vote of the delegates during the 2023 international convention resulted in a new "Discounted Member" category.

This category includes all members paying discounted dues, such as a discounted family member, Leo-Lion member, student member or young adult member. Discounted members have all of the same rights as an active member paying full dues, but do not count towards their club's delegate entitlement for district, multiple district or international conventions.

In addition, during the October board meeting, a resolution was passed to update the interpretation of what constitutes "one year and one day." This constitutional interpretation adjustment now requires members to be full dues-paying members of a single club for a continuous period of one year and one day before they count towards their club's total delegate entitlement.

For members to count toward the delegate entitlement for conventions during the 2024 calendar year, convert discounted members to a full dues-paying membership by December 15, 2023.



## It's Hall of Fame Time Once Again

## Here are the qualifications for a Lion to be nominated to the Hall of Fame.

- Any Lion, Lions Club, Zone or Region may nominate a candidate from their District to the MDC Hall of Fame.
- There is no nomination fee.
- The awards will be presented to up to four (4) candidates, a maximum of two (2) per District, inducted into the Hall of Fame each year.
- The District Governor must receive nominations at least 45 days prior to the District's Annual Convention.
- Each individual District will hold an election to determine the successful candidate(s).
- The award may be presented posthumously.
- Each candidate must have 15 years of service and not be a member of the current Council of Governors.
- Each candidate should have qualifications above and beyond the call of duty including social and human endeavors.

  He/She should be of good moral character and have a good reputation in his/her community.
- All sponsors shall use the standard MDC nomination form. No other application formats will be accepted.
- The sponsor(s) will ensure the candidate, or a representative, will attend the Multiple District Convention.
- All successful candidates will be inducted to the Hall of Fame at the next MDC Convention.
- The presentation of the MDC Hall of Fame Awards is the responsibility of the MDC Council Chairperson.
- A brief biography of each inductee shall be announced to the delegates attending the Annual MDC Convention, and published in the subsequent MDC Newsletter.

The District Governor of each District will be responsible to ensure that the MDC Hall of Fame Application Form, Candidate's bio and photograph are supplied to the MDC office at least one month prior to the MDC convention.

## News From Your Global Service Team



A healthy club functions well when every executive member performs his/her tasks that are assigned by LCI, your District or your own club. Congratulations to the 50 clubs that submitted their membership report to LCI by the end of November.

That is a 60% response rate and the best so far this year. Thanks to District C2 secretary, Gordon Prusky, who monitors the reports and sends us the information. Zone chairs are encouraged to contact the remaining 33 clubs to determine why reports are not reported. If training is necessary, the District through our GST team can arrange for on site training. Secretaries also submit club projects on MY LION . If burdened with the task, a club president or club administrator can also place club activities on MY LION.

We hope that club presidents are encouraging interclub visits among clubs in the zone and surrounding area. Fellowship is a big part of Lionism and sharing of ideas is the best way to consider a new project for your club. If any of your club executive struggle with the tasks expected of the position, please reach out to your zone chair for assistance. Club presidents, along with the executive should schedule a Governor visit ASAP and follow the Governor Visit protocol outlined in the Directory.

The best way for the club treasurer to monitor payment of dues is to print out membership cards at he beginning of the year and issue the cards as membership fees are paid. The cards are accessed by the treasurer on the LCI site. Membership cards are required to vote at conventions.

The zone chairs have possibly the most difficult of tasks. We ask that you continue to contact club secretaries who are reluctant or unable to complete reports. Many travel to zone meetings and Governor visits at your own expense. All zone chairs should know when Governor visits are scheduled for clubs in your zone. If the visits are not yet scheduled, contact the club presidents to do so as your calendar is also important.


## The Winter Solstice is Near.

It is literally a magic moment in time. On Thursday, December 21st, 2023 at 8:27pm Mountain time the sun is exactly over the Tropic of Capricorn. It is over almost as soon as it has begun.

Like many other astronomical terms, the word solstice comes from Latin. Owing to the Sun appearing to 'standstill' in the sky when it reaches the Tropic of Capricorn, the word *solstitium* was used which in turn is composed of the words *sol* (meaning 'sun') and *sistere* (meaning to 'standstill'). As well as marking the shortest day of the year, the winter solstice marks the first day of winter in the astronomical calendar, while in the meteorological calendar, we are already three weeks into winter.

## Prepare for your visit.

Tell the students: who you are; your Lions Club name; what Lions do; the importance of Canada Day and our flag; wear something that identifies you as a Lion.

## Things to remember.

Be positive; present flags & certificates(include teacher); ask teacher to print student's name on certificate; encourage discussion.

## Why do these plants appear every December?

It isn't a secret, but just a lost story. The Poinsettia was widely used in Aztec

rituals and revered for its strength and beauty. It was also used in medicines and potents with many legends and stories associated with the plant's wondrous power. It wasn't until the late 1820s when seeds of the poinsettia were brought back into the US. The then US Ambassador to Mexico, Joel Poinsett, who was also a botanist, was so enamored with the beauty of the wildly growing plant that he brought the seeds back to his greenhouses for cultivation. William Prescott, a historian, horticulturalist and friend of Poinsett, received some of the seeds as a gift and in time named the resulting plants Poinsettias after his good friend.
