If we reach a certain donation goal, we will have our name put on their Wall of Fame at the time of the official cheque presentation.

# An Eclipse is Coming to Calgary! Saturday, October 14th 9:19am to 11:39am.

An Annular Solar Eclipse will cross North, Central and South America on this date.

There are four types of solar eclipses—total, annular, partial, and hybrid. The one on October 14th is an annular solar eclipse. This happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth and when it is at or near its farthest point from Earth. Because the Moon is farther away from Earth, it appears smaller than the Sun and does not completely cover the Sun. As a result, the Moon appears as a dark disk on top of a larger, bright disk, creating what looks like a ring around the Moon. In Calgary, only 60-70% of the eclipse will be seen because of its path across north America. The closest place to see the annular eclipse in its entirety is Southern Oregon. Below illustrates how the Moon will pass across the Sun in Calgary.



# Lions International News Global Causes Update

In addition to the many ways Lions serve locally, we also work together to support global causes. This year, Lions Clubs International will be aligning their global causes with the focus areas of Lions Clubs International Foundation. LCI 's global causes will increase from five to eight.

#### **Childhood Cancer**



Globally, 400,00 have been diagnosed with cancer. Nine in ten diagnosed children live in low to middle income countries.

30% of children with cancer in low and middle income countries survive compared to greater than 80% in high income countries.

#### **Diabetes**



An estimated 463 million adults across the world are living with diabetes, and it is increasing rapidly. By 2045, the number is expected to reach 700 million.

#### Hunger



815 million people affected by hunger in 2016 which is 11% of the global population.155 million children under age five are stunted due to chronic malnutrition.

One third of annual food production is lost or wasted throughout the supply chain.

#### Vision



253 million people are blind or have moderate to severe distance vision impairment.1.1 billion have near-vision impairment simply because

they don 't have a pair of glasses. 89% of people with visual impairment live in developing countries.

#### **Disaster Relief**



90% of all disasters are water related.
25.3 million people are dis-

placed each year by sudden disasters.

Annual economic losses are estimated at over \$250 billion.

#### Humanitarian



15% of the world 's population experience disability, the prevalence being higher for developing countries. More than 190 million experience significant

disability. 20 million people need hospice care annually—3 million receive it.

#### Youth



Focus is to improve access to quality education, vital health services, and positive youth development for young people around the world.

One in three students reports being cyberbullied. 20% report skipping school because of it or violence. Reading scores and bullying are directly correlated.

#### **Environment**



12 million hectares of forest are destroyed each year. 6-7 million premature deaths annually caused by air pollution. 17 million metric tons of plastic entered the

ocean in 2021. Projected to double or triple by 2040. On third amount of generated waste is not safely managed.



Lions worldwide continue to prioritize disaster relief as one of their most important local service activities. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) now offers a wide variety of funding options designed to support Lions-led relief efforts during the various stages of disaster relief operations. Lions are key figures in their communities and play a vital role in this process.



Lions are rsponsible for assessing the needs in their district to maximize their relief efforts.

Depending on the needs within the community and the Lions' plan of action, expanded funding options from LCIF enable the Lions to have a greater impact in the communities where they live and serve.

# A Grant for every phase of disaster







#### **Disaster & Emergency Preparedness**

The **Disaster Preparedness Grant** is for Lions districts interested in partnering with local authorities and other community organizations to plan and prepare for *future* relief efforts. The goal is to determine the Lions ' role in the community before the disaster strikes.

- Grants available in amounts of US\$5,000 US\$10,000
- · Districts may apply once in a three year period; clubs may not apply
- · Local funds must account for 10% of the grant request
- · Must be applied for in advance of a disaster
- Priority will be given to districts susceptible to regular and repeated natural disasters and those that appoint ALERT Chairpersons (or equivalent position).
- Funds must be spent within 6 months of receipt
- The request must detail how the Lions' project supports the community's overall local emergency and disaster preparedness plan

#### What types of activities are eligible?

Lions participation in local emergency response and ALERT training programs; stockpiling of key materials and supplies for future response including assembly of ALERT kits; advance support for first responders, food banks, medical facilities and shelters; outreach activities to community preparedness, education and awareness.

#### Immediate Needs

The **Emergency Grant** is for Lions districts interested in addressing the immediate needs of disaster victims in the wake of a natural disaster.

- Grants available in amounts of US\$5,000 US\$10,000
- District Governor must apply within 30 days of the disaster's occurrence; clubs may not apply
- At least 100 people need to be impacted and/or displaced by the disaster
- Funds must be spent within 30 days of receipt
- The request must detail the Lions' plan of action for their active involvement in providing immediate relief aid to disaster victims.

What types of activities are eligible? The purchase and distribution of basic necessities, such as food, water, clothing, blankets, first-aid items, and cleaning supplies.



## Lions International News

#### **Short-Term Relief Services**

The **Community Recovery Grant** is for Lions districts interested in supporting short-term clean-up and repair efforts when other organizations have already met immediate needs. The relief effort will focus on a smaller or specific population among those impacted by the disaster.

- Grants available in amounts up to US\$20,000
- District Governor must apply within 60 days of the disaster's occurrence; clubs may not apply
- Districts may apply once in a 6 month period
- · At least 100 people need to be impacted and/or displaced by the disaster
- · Construction projects are not eligible
- Funds must be spent within 60 days of receipt.

The request must detail the Lions ' plan of action based on their assessment of short-term needs; including a budget and timeline.

#### What types of activities are eligible?

The purchase of equipment and supplies for debris removal; equipment and materials for minor repair and refurbishment of groups of homes, medical facilities, schools and other public institutions; coordination of blood drives; and temporary/mobile eye care clinics for disaster victims to replace lost glasses.

#### Long-term Construction/Equipment

The **Standard Grant** is for Lions districts interested in rebuilding or equipping vital public facilities, such as schools, medical facilities, and centers for the elderly and disabled that were damaged by a natural disaster. This is a matching grant opportunity requiring local funding from the Lions. The grant range is US\$10,000 - US\$100,000. Additional criteria apply. Please refer to the Standard Grant Criteria and Application.


#### **Important Points**

There is a separate grant application and criteria for each type of grant. Other criteria apply.

Districts may apply for either an Emergency Grant or Community Recovery Grant, but not both.

Disaster funds may not be handed over to another agency, group or organization. The Lions must lead the projects or relief efforts..

A final report is required upon the completion of the grant project. Failure to submit the report in a timely manner may impact the district 's eligibility to obtain future grants.

# **Emerging Leader Award**

# October 9th, 2023 Thanksgiving Day

Throughout human existence evidence of "thanks" in a variety of forms is not difficult to find. Depending on the culture and location, the celebration can vary in the time of the year—but always centered around the source of sustenance.

Fast forward to relatively recent history. The first Canadian Thanksgiving was reportedly held in 1578 by the English explorer Martin Frobisher in what is now Newfoundland. His expedition was attempting to travel through the northwest passage when they landed on the shores of the New World. They gave thanks for their safe passage and the abundance of available food that the land offered.

It wasn 't until 1957 that the Canadian government finally chose the second Monday in October as the official date for a nation-wide celebration of thanks. The day was chosen as it was generally the end of Canadian harvesting and prior to the cold of winter.

Our neighbours to the south base their Thanksgiving date mainly around the arrival of pilgrims on the Mayflower in 1621. However, as in Canada, the actual day of celebration changed a number of times before, in 1941, the fourth Thursday in November was settled in the United States as their federal holiday.

Many Lions clubs globally provide free Thanksgiving meals in their communities. It is an ideal time for Lions to remember those who are less fortunate and without the means to enjoy not only the meal but the company of others.

Justice Brian does not have a District award named after him.

Last year's cabinet wanted to locally recognize his many

Lionistic achievements that are legendary.

Many times in our clubs, potential leaders are not recognized at the District level for their early accomplishments. With an award such as the Emerging Leader Award we felt we would urge the district to honour present and future Lion leaders.

The criteria was suggested to PIP Brian and he agreed.

Early proven leadership skills, good club attendance, and high moral character are stressed.

There is no cost to the Lion or club for this award. The main focus was emerging leaders with less than 5 years in Lions.

It was well received the first year.

The award is presented in front of your fellow Lions at our C 2 Convention.

## **CLERC Serves the World**



#### Dear CLERC

Our medical mission just returned from a successful trip - being able to treat over 3000 patients as a group that includes GP, ObGyn, dentistry, and optometry. We were able to bring eyecare services to 1200 of these patients. We were able to see students from the orphanage as well as the surrounding village of Ndlani but also extend to villagers that came from even 5 hrs away from the facility as there was a large need for free medical care as well as pharmaceuticals and glasses.

The majority of patients had complaints of photosensitivity as well as the need for distance and reading glasses. We were able to distribute sunglasses to 400 high school children in the MCF orphanage as well as patients who came in from the neighbouring villages. It was a gift to be able to bring sight to those in need. We were able to help a motorbiker who was a -7.00 myope and a security guard who was a -4.00 but didn't have glasses. We helped many students with glasses for school and a large portion of very grateful farmers who needed reading glasses to be able to reconnect with the bible.

The contributions from the Lions Club and the community who have donated their glasses were so very much appreciated. I have enclosed a PDF with some photos and a Thank you to you and the Lions Club that made our trip a success.

## **CLERC Celebrates**



CLERC held its 25th Anniversary Celebration at the CLERC Warehouse on September 9th, 2023. Those that attended represented Lion and non-Lion volunteers, clubs, and both districts as well as special guests. PIP Justice Brian Stevenson was the keynote speaker and a selection of his inspiring address is below.

"On a hot and muggy July afternoon at the Lions International Convention at Cedar Point, Ohio, 1925, the International 1st Vice president, Harry Newman, a Toronto lawyer, escorted the speaker, a woman, to the podium. Her name was Helen Keller

and she was accompanied by her friend Anne

Sullivan.

Over the next fourteen minutes, with the assistance of Miss Sullivan. Miss Keller issued a challenge to this young nine year old service organization. That challenge set the course for one of the Lions ' major service activities—one of their 98 years—assistance to the blind and vision impaired around the world.

"I appeal to you Lions-you who are strong and brave and kind-will you not constitute yourselves as 'Knights of the Blind' in this crusade against darkness?" Helen Keller, 1925

And the Lions accepted her challenge, and over the following years have changed the lives of hundreds of millions of fellow human beings on every continent on our planet.

This Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre is one outstanding example of fulfilling our motto "We Serve" and it compliments the theme of our International President this year " Changing The World".

This eyeglass recycling centre is one of 19 approved Lions

centres that process used eyeglasses in the world. Others are in Australia, France, Italy, New Zealand, South Africa, Spain and there are 12 in the United States.

> Since our beginnings in 1997 through June of this year we have sent over 6,300,000 pairs. Over the last 5 years CLERC has averaged shipping over 300,000 pairs annually.

In addition to the many Lion volunteers in Calgary and Southern Alberta who do the recycling, we also get many non-Lion volunteers. We also receive great assistance from inmates at the Calgary Correctional Centre who volunteer. We would also be remiss if we did not express appreciation to the many corporations and others who have assisted us over the years. Without

the assistance of our corporate and institutional partners, and our Lion and non-Lion volunteers, CLERC could not have been able to survive.

There have been quite a few Lions who I regard as 'Giants' - driving forces that have resulted in our success in establishing eyeglass recycling in Canada-but I want to mention just two-the late Lion Bernie Gribben, who ran the CLERC operations from 2003-2012, and Lion Darryl Rawleigh, who has been behind 90% of the operations from 2012 to present."

# "Just Ask" Give It a Try. Submitted by Council Chair Brent Johnson

Lions International is the largest humanitarian organization in the world thanks to its 1.4 million members serving their communities in over 200 countries. This impact would be impossible without the strength and fortitude of its members. To maintain and even grow this positive impact, bringing in new members and creating new clubs is essential. Fostering a culture of recruitment at the club level ensures that new clubs and new members are excited to join the service-driven communities of Lions International.

The good news is that it can be as easy as *just asking*. The *Just Ask!* program has been designed to help clubs navigate membership growth while incorporating the Global Membership Approach. It also goes beyond recruitment. Just Ask! helps clubs effectively manage club growth through revitalizing membership and remotivating existing members.

#### Just Ask! and Global Membership Approach

Just Ask! encompasses the four steps of the Global Membership Approach process. The first step is to build a team of people who are dedicated to increasing a club's membership. Once formed, the team should assess the status of their current club and the surrounding community to build a vision. It is important for your club to think about what the club wants to be and what goals the club wants to accomplish. It is important for the team to include input from all club members in the process whenever possible.

Once the vision has been set, the team needs to consider how they plan to accomplish these goals. This is about the who, what, where and when your club will begin. It is also important to consider how to approach new members in your community to learn about their interests and see how those interests can fit into your club. Once the plan is set, it is time to put it into motion. Whether this is through membership-focused events or inviting prospective members to an upcoming service event, the key to *Just Ask!* is simple: explore opportunities in your community and encourage club members to ask people they know to come and learn more about the club and how they can benefit by becoming a Lion.

# Case Study: Multiple District C and Lethbridge West Lethbridge Lions Club

So how has this worked in action? How can Lions who are driven to grow their club and create new clubs take the first step to plan an event? Learn more? Or teach others about what *Just Ask!* has to offer?

These were some of the questions Lion leaders in Multiple District C in Canada asked themselves as they considered ways to revitalize the multiple district. As a first step, the 2022-23 district governors, Suzanne Leshchyshyn and Darryl Rawleigh, teamed up with Global

Action Team Area Leader Brent Johnson to plan an event in central Alberta. They wanted the event to be an opportunity to actively engage with Lions.

The team of District Governor Suzanne, District Governor Darryl and GAT Area Leader Brent organized the event in Olds, Alberta so Lions in both districts had the opportunity to take part. When considering what resources would be the most effective at communicating the message of membership growth, the newly redeveloped *Just Ask!* materials were the perfect fit.

Twenty clubs were invited, 10 from each district. Invitations were sent to presidents, membership chairmen, GAT coordinators, and anyone who had an interest in equipping themselves with new skills for member recruitment. On the day of the workshop, 35 Lions took part from about a dozen different clubs in Alberta. The new *Just Ask!* resources provided opportunities for interactive conversation and brainstorming to strategize prospective member engagement. These materials facilitated worthwhile discussion and drove home the message that leadership in the multiple district is there to support clubs with growing their membership. Participants left feeling positive and motivated to reinvent recruitment and hold member events!



# "Just Ask" Give It a Try. Submitted by Council Chair Brent Johnson



The message continued to spread. In the weeks following the workshop, a fellow member in Area Leader Brent 's own club, Lethbridge West Lethbridge Lions Club, brought the *Just Ask!* guide to a club meeting. This motivated the club to hold a successful membership event with seven new members being inducted, four of whom joined as a direct result of the event. Additionally, Area Leader Brent has been taking the guides to zone chair meetings around his district as well as writing pieces for his district 's quarterly newsletter to keep up the momentum. Feedback has been continually positive, and membership is now a regular part of many club agendas in the multiple district.

"I feel that the *Just Ask!* program and brochure are a couple of the best membership tools ever created by Lions International. Our members who are interested in membership growth find them easy to use and the results are proven, " said Brent Johnson, council chair elect and Constitutional Area II GAT area leader.


